There's a lovely image in the Gospel of Mark, where Jesus encourages his friends to get away to a quieter place so that they can rest. To do this, they get in a boat and go to the other side of Lake Galilee. This image brings together rest and boats, a combination that is also relevant to what's

been happening in the life of our church and local community over the last month. We were delighted that we went ahead with the River Thames Blessing in the middle of July – please see the article inside this newsletter. It was wonderful that so many of the river organisations came out to support this service. Thanks to all of them for taking part. As we begin the month of August, I want to focus on the rest and recuperation side of this Gospel image. It's been a tough and, for some people, a very busy year. # **Loving Your Burial Ground** Week 5 – 13<sup>th</sup> June

Wonderful weather all week, so no changes to the programme! All the talks attracted at least twenty people, and we have been asked to repeat the ones on churchyard history, the graves, and the bees, and to offer another guided walk around the trees and flowers. The choir concert on 12<sup>th</sup> June attracted an audience of over sixty, including Munira Wilson MP, and the churchyard teas and Songs of Praise on 13<sup>th</sup> June saw well over one hundred and fifty people, including the Mayor and Mayoress. The concert and teas raised about £750 mainly by electronic donation.

During the week children from St Mary



and St Peter's School visited class by class. We are now looking further activity for the pupils such as building a bee hotel, or a wildlife refuge area, and writing a churchyard worksheet for children. The

Adopt a Grave scheme has attracted over fifty people to care for some ninety graves and more interest is registered every week, but it is never too late to volunteer!

To add focus to the week we had made a drone-based video of the church and churchyard showing their exceptional significance to the area. We are now working on a five-year action plan, to complement the policy which we agreed with the Council in 2019. There has been support for continuing to hold church services outside regularly, as conditions allow, and to have a further Songs of Praise in the autumn. ## **River Blessing Service**

Due to Covid restrictions, arrangements had to be a little different this year, for our fifth River Blessing Service. The service started as normal, but then a small group consisting of the Rev. Caroline Halmshaw and representatives of several local organisations with Thames connections, went down to the river, while the rest of us remained in church to follow proceedings live on the big screen. Organisations involved were the RNLI, Royal British Legion, Tamesis Yacht & Canoe Club, Sea Cadets and the Thames Boat Project. The Rev. Chris Kennedy preached about the important role the river plays in local life. He emphasised the river's healing role, especially in lockdown. The choir sang two appropriate spirituals, a real pleasure to listen to. With a backdrop of a myriad variety of boats we all heard the river being blessed. A cross adorned with orange and yellow flowers was tossed into the river, followed by flowers from the other organisations.

The weather was kind, and the pictures reminded us what a busy place the river is. Most people use it sensibly, but we remain grateful for the services of the RNLI who rescue both people and animals - do you remember Sammy the seal and the stranded minke whale?

We would like to thank Katherine Matthews for all the time and energy she put into organising this service, and also the technical team concerned. It was a heart-warming experience.

## **Update from Mozambique**

I will start with the good news that the building of the new school at Chimoio is going really well and is now above the first level of windows. It is a miracle that this project continues to move forward apace. Also, that Bishop Manuel, pictured here with Rev. Albertina, and other helpers planted 104 trees near the school on World Environment Day. This tree a gift to the bishop from Addis Ababa.

However, other news is not so good, with the insurgency, the huge number of displaced people arriving in Pemba (our linked Parish), lack of food security, and poor access to health resources and education. Even Coronavirus, currently in its third wave, cannot be given greater priority. The situation remains desperate. We sent all £8,310 of the money you raised for our Lent Appeal 2021 to MANNA, (the church network in Mozambique and

Angola), to help in Pemba where many refugees are being hosted by families; made possible by MANNA (along with other aid suppagencies) lying emergency food parcels to these host families, containing rice, oil,



soap and water purifying tablets. These combined communities are also working together to clear land for a new farm, as part of the recovery plan for displaced people.

We pray for Bishop Manuel and all his team. Suzie Gordon (more photos and an extended report are on our website)

## **Hong Kong Immigration 2021**

Since Hong Kong was handed back to mainland China in 1997, on a 'one country two systems' arrangement, life has become increasingly difficult for many.

Democratic freedoms have vanished, and those who have protested have found themselves in trouble. Consequently, the UK has offered to welcome those who have the right to live here, and who can show they can support themselves for six months. Many thousands wish to come.

UKHK.org is a church organisation created to welcome and help settle all Hong Kongers arriving in the UK. Over 500 churches have registered to be part of this, including us, St Mary with St Alban. We have been asked to find out if there are any Chinese groups or individuals locally, who either need help for friends or relatives or who can offer help. Cantonese speakers will be particularly welcome.

There is also a request for offers of shortterm emergency accommodation, being organised in conjunction with Upbeat Communities who will make all the arrangements and offer training.
