Churchyard Sunday Dedication of the Sensory Area

On June 26th, we welcomed Councillor Rhi Lee, Deputy Mayor and Cathy Maker, Director of RUILS, the local independent living charity, to our 10am service followed by the dedication of the Sensory Area.

Rev Joe Moffatt spoke about the important role the churchyard plays in the life of the church and the local community. While being a former place of burial it is very much for the living, where the bereaved can feel closer to their loved ones and to God. Recently the Holy Gardeners have helped nurture the biodiversity of the churchyard and foxes, birds, insects and bees now abound. It is



also a place for meeting people with two 'chatty' benches, part of a RUILS initiative. The churchyard is truly an oasis in a busy suburb; a place for contemplating life, death and the promise of resurrection.

Following the service all made their way to the bottom end of the churchyard for the dedication of the new area and the unveiling of the information plaque by the Deputy Mayor. Thanks to the enthusiasm and drive of churchwarden Robin Field-Smith, the Holy Gardeners and a local council grant, a beautiful sensory area has been created, with a new path and bench, a raised bed planted with brightly coloured and strongly scented flowers, a braille sign and an audio post. A garden accessible to all!

Flower Festival

This year we had a very different theme – 'Grown, not Flown' and asked parishioners to harvest flowers and foliage from their gardens. We did not know what to expect

and indeed it gave us a big surprise on the day.

Our plan was to achieve sustainable displays with no carbon footprint. So we reused dried poppy heads, wheat ears, dried hydrangeas from Christmas wreaths, all without oasis, the very eco-unfriendly green foam. Our older arrangers advised how to use wire and moss with wide round containers. A very different experience needing much longer stemmed flowers. The result was beautiful natural, free flowing displays.



Tea and cakes were enjoyed all afternoon in the Churchyard, raising the magnificent sum of £609 for the Building Anew project, while the Handbell Group gave two special recitals in the church. We were also joined on our eco journey by local Craft Group *Plain & Pearl* who were recycling craft materials for charity (raising £101 for the church). Diversity & Inclusion Group

Slavery and the City Walk

Sunday 2nd October 2-4pm

The Diversity & Inclusion Group invites you to join us on this walk in the City of London on Sunday 2nd October, led, as a private tour, by a qualified guide from Six in the City (sixinthecity.co.uk). Tickets cost £12 per person, £10 for under 18s, excluding travel to and from the City. There are 20 tickets available and a suggested minimum age of 12 years.

The walks lasts two hours, from 2-4pm, starting at Paternoster Square and finishing at Fen Court, a distance of just under a mile. The walk is all on a level, apart from one small set of stairs at the Bank of England. The walk explores sites

and institutions in the City with direct links to slavery. We will learn about the people who made money from this trade in human beings, as well as those who fought for its abolition. We will also hear about how some of the most powerful and influential institutions in the City have issued apologies for their role in the slave trade, and how they now wish to bring about changes.
