Vicar's Viewpoint

The vexed topic of my use of humour in my ministry has arisen more than once in recent weeks. Despite my perma-frown, and precaffeine grumpiness, I do like to use humour as a means of communicating a message and while I take life and my faith very seriously, a light touch seems to work at times.

Whether it is right or wrong, appropriate or inappropriate, to use levity in one's spiritual life (or at parish level) is a matter that you can discuss at length over your morning coffee, but I do wonder if there is too little to smile about in life at the moment. Increasingly, the world feels like an irretrievable mess. Truth is lost; some world leaders use disingenuity as a legitimate rhetorical tool; our young are killing one another in our own city; people in gainful employment still cannot afford to live or eat; failing mental health eclipses the opportunities that life would otherwise offer so many - and all that, before we talk about war. Truth be told, life doesn't feel like a laugh-a-minute at the moment.

That is until I visit our local schools and spend some time with your children. School assemblies are a regular part of my week and humour is a necessary ingredient – not because I am an entertainer, but because these youngsters give me hope and in the face of hope, I smile. In the light of the Resurrection, I smile. In my Sanctuary, I smile – and I want to make you smile. I pray that, just once in a while, I can do that small thing; then perhaps/I will have made a tiny difference to your day.

Christian Aid Week 2024

The theme of this year's Christian Aid Week is 'Push Back Against Poverty' with an emphasis on how neighbours near and far can come together to fight the dehumanising effects of poverty. The focus is on Aline, pictured on the poster, from Burundi, a central African country where 70% of the population are affected by poverty. Married young, then later forced to flee from her violent husband and separated from her children, Aline ended up on the streets. Her life was turned around by a community workshop funded by Christian Aid, where she was taught how to form a Village Savings and Loans Association (VSLA) and establish a steady income. VSLAs mean people can save for their future and borrow money to kickstart small rural businesses. With a start-up loan. Aline was able to set up a small business, trading avocados and peanuts locally. Due to her hard work, determination and faith, Aline's business has grown and now she earns enough to rent a house and has been reunited with her children. She can plan for the future with hope.

Aline's long and difficult journey out of extreme poverty began with a little support, knowledge and faith from Christian Aid supporters. Thank you for whatever you can give. Cathy Randall

God's Acre in Teddington

'The church sits within a churchyard of almost one acre, a precious green public space and a major contribution to the village church character that St Mary's retains.'

This comment from a heritage expert is echoed by local residents and visitors who daily walk in our churchyard, and enjoy the sights, sounds, colours, and smells. There has been a church here since 1217, but an area around for burials was only set up in the 17th century. The boundary was extended six times until 1879 when it was decided to open a new cemetery in Shacklegate Lane, and the churchyard became neglected with the building of St Alban's church (now the Landmark Centre).

Only since St Mary's was restored as the parish church in 1977 has the churchyard been cherished and nourished, with the welcome involvement of Richmond Council and our own team of volunteers. From 8th to 16th June we will be holding a 'Loving your Burial Ground Celebrations', a chance for everyone to come along



either to a range of events to learn more and celebrate this jewel, or just enjoy the trees, flowers, birds, bees, the sensory area, or many interesting memorials.

We will be promoting the 'Building Anew' project and the chance to 'Buy a Brick' for facilities (meeting room, kitchenette, and toilets) to help us better welcome and entertain visitors. For now, teas on Sunday 9th June will be in the Parish Hall, after touring the churchyard. The programme is in next month's newsletter, and on the website and social media.
